How do I complete and submit my task?	<p>Complete the tasks on paper/handwritten or digitally and bring a copy either paper or electronically to your enrolment appointment, also take this to your first lesson in September.</p> <p>If you did not attend the Taster Day, don't worry – this isn't essential for completing the work, just make sure you bring it to your enrolment appointment.</p> <p>Lay your work out as tables using the information in the bullet points below in task 1 details.</p>
Introduction to your Bridging Task	<p>In preparation for studying Criminology at Franklin Sixth Form College, the following tasks you are about to complete will prepare you for the first assessment criteria (AC) for the first unit of the course, which is all about looking at different types of crimes.</p> <p>Such crimes range from domestic abuse to organised financial crime to e-crime and many more crimes. You will look at a variety of different features of some of the crimes we will study at the start of the course, which many appear throughout the two-year course.</p>
Task details	<p>The following tasks need to be completed and presented in the ways mentioned above. Some links to websites will be added into the resources box below:</p> <p><u>Task 1:</u></p> <p>Conduct research into the following different types of crime:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">● Professional white-collar crime● E-crime – focus on cyberbullying● Domestic abuse● Honour crime● Hate crime.

	<p><i>Your research should include the following for each of the above crimes:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● A definition ● Most likely victims – e.g. age/ethnicity/sex/class/any connection to offender ● Most likely offenders – e.g. age/ethnicity/sex/class/any connection to the victim ● Public awareness – e.g. are there any campaigns that raise awareness of these crimes/how often are they in the media/were you taught about these crimes at school? ● X1 real-life examples of each of the crimes – summarise into no more than a small paragraph. <p><u>Task 2:</u></p> <p>Organised criminal gangs (organised crime) are one type of crime we cover. Conduct research into <u>the Krays and one other different criminal organised gang</u> – pick One other <u>from the list below:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The Mafia (Italian) ● The Mafia (Russian) ● The Yakuza, ● The Triads, ● Mexican Drug Cartels. <p><i>Types of things to research on two of the above include (But not limited to):</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Country gang originally comes from ● Countries/areas they operate in ● Size of the groups ● Types of crime they are involved in ● Tattoos/symbols associated with the groups etc.
