## **A Level Ancient History**

## Part A - Bridging Work Task

This is a fantastic opportunity to expand your understanding of A Level Ancient History as you prepare for enrolment and start at Franklin in September.

The work will take you around **2 hours** so plan your time to best suit you.

How do I complete and submit my task?	Complete the tasks on paper/handwritten or digitally, and bring a copy, either paper or electronically, to your enrolment appointment. Also, bring this along to your first lesson in September. If you didn't attend the Taster Day, don't worry. It isn't essential for completing this work, but please ensure that you have completed this bridging work.
Introduction to your Bridging Task	The first topic area you will study in September will be Ancient Greece and the Persian and Peloponnesian Wars. This task will give you context to the problems in Greece around the time of the wars and introduce you to the different cultures of the most powerful states in Ancient Greece (Athens and Sparta).

Particularly focus on the political system and how society worked.</li> <li>Research and summarise Ancient Athens, again focusing on the political system and society.</li> <li>Write an answer, using your research notes to the following question:         <ul> <li>"How could the cultures of Athens and Sparta lead to problems in their relationship?"</li> <li>Try and compare the two states (Sparta and Athens), in the following areas, thinking about their similarities and differences:</li></ul></li></ol>
