	Play games that improve your general knowledge or vocabulary. For example: Trivial Pursuit, Taboo, or Cranium
	3. Watch a film that celebrates a literary figure or a famous adaptation. For example: Bright Star (2009), The Invisible Woman (2013), The Color Purple (1985), or A Streetcar Named Desire (1951)
	 Form an opinion about current debates in literature by listening to podcasts or watching TV shows such as: <u>You're Dead to Me</u> or <u>Between the Covers</u>
