At the start of the spring term, you will then study Unit 1 Psychological Approaches and Applications where you will learn the varying ways in which human behaviour can be understood and apply this knowledge to Gender, Consumer Behaviour and Aggression.
	In Year 2 you will complete Unit 3 Health Psychology where you will gain an understanding of the theories and treatments for stress and addiction
	followed by Unit 4 Criminal and Forensic Psychology (Coursework) where

	 you will study theories of criminal behaviour, punishment and behaviour modification strategies and criminal profiling. Studying this course will give you a wide range of skills: Application, Evaluation, Analysis, Extended writing, Organisation, Independence, Critical thinking, Problem-solving, Communication, Empathy and an Awareness of human behaviour.
