	Progression after this course: Many of our music students have progressed on to study music at either a university or at one of the prestigious music conservatoires across the country. Other options such as music within education and classical performance courses are also available.		
Preparing for the course	 Although this course does not heavily feature traditional notation, there are elements of music theory that are acknowledged. A basic ability to read and understand music would be beneficial. Play along / sing along videos on YouTube can be quite helpful. If you haven't performed as an ensemble before, it may be useful to join a band, choir, or orchestra to develop performance skills as part of a group. (If this is not possible before September don't worry, there will be plenty of opportunities for you to do this whilst at Franklin.) Next time you are at a gig / concert / performance, take note of what is involved in organising the event. Try and notice the different types of job roles involved in making the performance a success.
