Introduction to: A-Level Textiles & Fashion

Choosing Textiles & Fashion as part of your study programme was a brilliant decision! What is so great about doing Textiles & Fashion and where can it take you?

Lesson	Topic/Content
Introduction	A-Level Fashion & Textiles involves studying a broad range of practices and techniques. Inspired by observational studies you will develop your ideas through investigating textile artists and fashion designers from different periods in time. You will be exploring print, embroidery, fabric construction methods such as wet and needle felting, garment construction and fabric manipulation to name a few. Following the course students tend to either study the Art Foundation (offered at Franklin) or apply to university to study B.A. courses such as Fashion design, Fashion Marketing/Promotion, Interior Design, Textile Design and Surface Pattern etc.
Feed your	Look around you for sources of inspiration
Curiosity	Fashion and Textile designers are stimulated by all sorts of things to inspire their work. Personal experiences, world events/issues, journeys they've been on or places they've visited can all spark their imagination. Look at objects, natural forms or anything around you that you personally find interesting and consider how you could interpret them using a range of art materials. Try sketching, drawing or painting onto a variety of surfaces. See how the Textile artist Cas Holmes works for inspiration Making Connections: Mark Layer and Stitch with Fibre Arts Tales Two - YouTube
	Using any materials, papers, fabrics etc. you have at home, have a go at making your own surface design. Feel free to stitch, print or manipulate it in different ways. It could be a collage or simply a surface texture based on a pattern or object you have at home.
	Investigate new techniques
	Have a go at something you've never done before. Research techniques you feel personally inspired by and give it a try. They could be related to stitch, print, dye, knit and garment construction. A good place to start is 250 Textile Techniques ideas textiles techniques, fabric art, how to dye fabric (pinterest.co.uk)
